



# Real Gucci or fake?

HONG KONG (AP) — It may say Gucci, Pierre Cardin or Christian Dior, but the odds are growing that if it's bought in Hong Kong, it's phony — an Italian, South Korean or local imitation.

Hong Kong's reputation as the shopping paradise of Asia has been tarnished lately by a spate of lawsuits involving elegant fakes.

Dr. Udo Gucci, head of the Italian fashion house which bears his name, became so annoyed at the fake Gucci handbags, belts and other leather goods he saw in Hong Kong last month that he took out a newspaper advertisement warning that the company would take legal action against businessmen manufacturing or selling imitations.

"I think without hesitation, we are the most copied people in the world," Gucci said in an interview. "It's awful, just awful. But you have to fight it. The only thing is to keep changing designs and to take legal action wherever possible."

Dior's leading take-fighter, Kenneth Boey, said the com-

pany sued eight retailers this year for selling imitation Dior purses and accessories. "We mean business because the public is being cheated and we're going to keep on suing until they take the hint," he said.

Gucci said the number of copies available here had grown enormously since he visited in 1976 but the situation wasn't "as scandalous" as he had been told. In some South American countries, he said, it is "very, very scandalous — worse than Hong Kong — because they actually open shops with the Gucci name and claim to be us."

Y.Y. Leung, chief industry officer of Hong Kong's trade investigation agency, said "just a small fraction" of the 50 criminal prosecutions over the last three years for making or selling counterfeit goods involved name designers.

He said in an interview that "the number is definitely increasing" along with the number of civil suits involving fashion designers.

"The main problem is that more people are getting involved in this kind of thing," Leung said. "But the consumers are also getting

## Torn leg sewn back on

CENTRAL ISLIP, N.Y. (AP) — The way 11-year-old Elizabeth McFadden remembers it, there was "this big, black thing coming at me." Then the train severed her right leg.

When she awoke, Betty saw her father at her bedside.

"You have your leg on," said John McFadden, but his daughter didn't understand — she was sure she had an artificial leg.

"No, babe," said MacFadden. "It's your own leg."

The leg, cut from the sixth-grader's body at mid-thigh Sunday after she fell in front of a Long Island Rail Road train, was restored in eight hours of surgery at Smithtown General Hospital.

"It was a very emotional experience," said Betty's mother, Maureen. "When she found out she had her leg, she looked up at us and said, 'I love

both of you very, very much.' When the doctors came in, she looked at them and said, 'Thank you very, very much.'"

Betty was reported "doing beautifully" Monday by the head nurse at the hospital, and one of her doctors said the prospect that she would recover use of her leg was good.

"We're very optimistic," said Dr. Gerald Wertlieb, an orthopedic surgeon who was one of the team of doctors who performed the surgery. "The leg is pink and warm and certainly seems to show that it's going to live."

Betty and her sister Alice, 12, were playing near their home here Sunday when other children began chasing them. They ran across the tracks, and Betty fell.

## Taxing law overturned

BUFFALO, N.Y. (AP) — A state judge has overturned a new law which was designed to temporarily protect homeowners from sudden property tax increases and local governments from massive lawsuits for tax refunds.

The law, ruled unconstitutional Friday by state Supreme Court Justice Frank J. Kromberg, made it more difficult for individual businesses to challenge their tax assessments — challenges, which if successful would have shifted more of the local tax burden to homeowners.

Until this law was signed last July, the state had always required property to be assessed for tax purposes at its "full value." But before 1975, when the state's highest court ruled that the law meant what it said, assessors valued different kinds of property at different percentages of their actual market worth.

Generally, commercial property was assessed at a greater percentage of its value than residential property, forcing business to pick up a greater share of the cost of government. A recent legislative study said

the additional cost to business is about \$500 million a year.

To prevent the businesses from suing to get it back, the 1978 statute required aggrieved taxpayers who wanted refunds to prove not only that they are overtaxed in relation to other property-owners in their area, but to others holding property of the same "major type," for example, commercial, residential, or farm land.

While the law protected homeowners and local governments, it also formally recognized the unequal tax burden on business, at a time when state government is trying to attract or keep business in New York.

Many lawmakers concede that a full revision of the state's property tax system is necessary, and a state commission is studying the problem. In the meantime, however, they are reluctant to antagonize either businessmen who have threatened to take their payrolls elsewhere, or homeowners, whose complaints about rising property taxes have received more attention since the passage of California's Proposition 13.
