

# Weather

During Thursday night, rain is forecast for the Pacific Northwest Coast, with snow in parts of the Pacific Northwest states and the Northern Intermountain region. Snow also is forecast for parts of the Upper Mississippi Valley, the Great Lakes and parts of the Ohio Valley. Snow is possible in the Northern Intermountain region and the North Atlantic Coast states, with rain possible in the Mid Pacific Coast, the Lower Ohio Valley, the Gulf Coast and parts of the South Atlantic Coast states. Elsewhere the weather will be fair.

Locally, there will be a 70-percent chance of snow tonight, with an inch or so possible overnight. Low 20 to 25. Variable winds becoming southeast 10 to 20 mph.

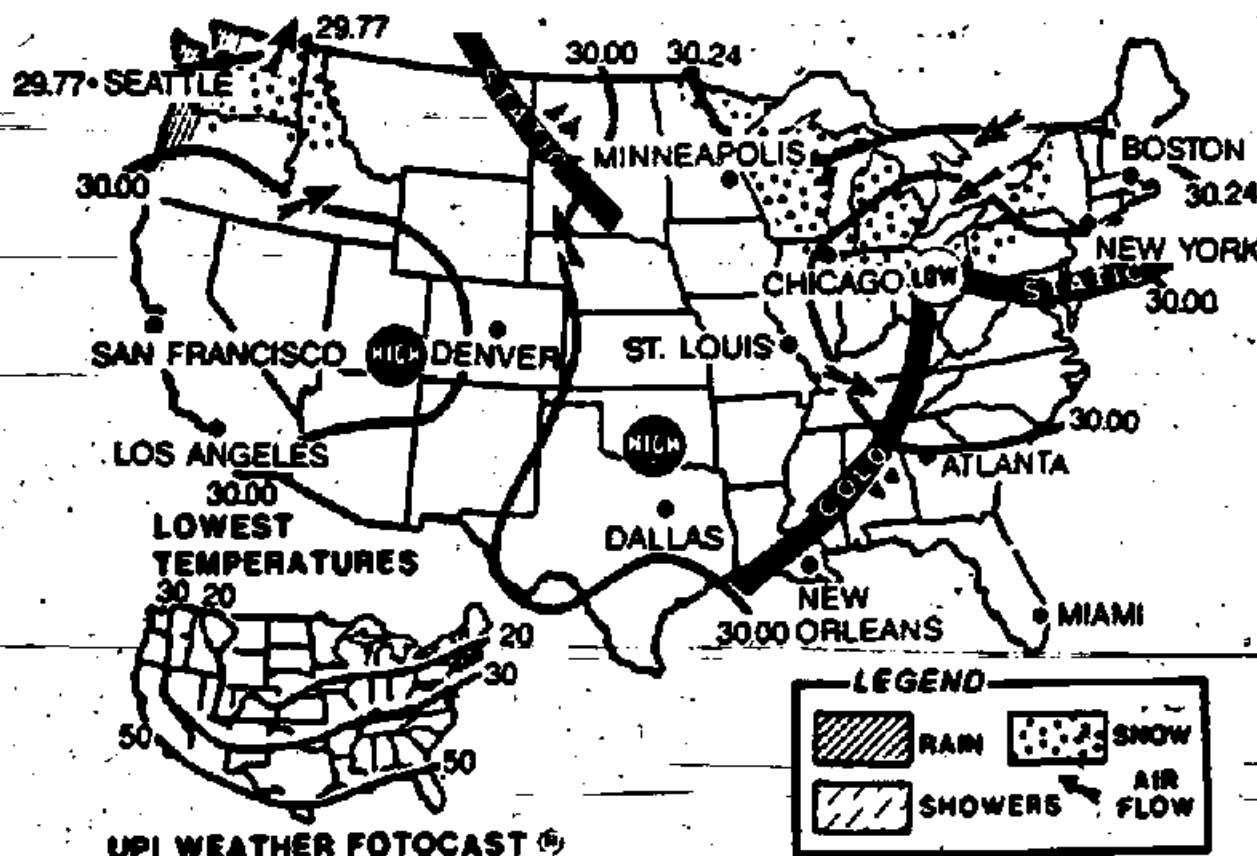

## Health notes

### More kidney patients halt dialysis

BOSTON (UPI) — Increasing numbers of patients on long-term kidney dialysis are choosing to stop the treatments and die, usually because they are old or suffer other medical problems, researchers said today.

Terminating treatment "is a common mode of death" in patients receiving long-term dialysis, they said.

### Mammary artery grafts better

BOSTON (UPI) — Heart patients who have the internal mammary artery used in a bypass operation instead of a leg vein live longer with less risk of hardening of the arteries, researchers said today.

"Ten-year actuarial survival for patients who received an internal mammary artery graft was 86.6 percent, as compared with 75.9 percent" for those who had leg vein grafts, said Dr. Floyd Loop and 10 colleagues at The Cleveland Clinic Foundation.

### Heart patients begin new year

The world's first female artificial heart patient began the New Year showing improvement, while two other recipients of the Jarvik-7 bionic heart, William Schroeder and Murray Haydon, rang in 1986 like millions of other Americans — watching football games.

In Minneapolis, doctors said Wednesday Mary Lund's neurological status had improved and she continued to breathe well on her own for brief periods.

### Heart malformations increasing

ATLANTA (UPI) — An exhaustive study of 13 million U.S. births shows major increases in two serious heart malformations, but the rate of most birth defects studied by federal health officials remained unchanged.

The study by the national Centers for Disease Control said there was a 17.5-percent increase in patent ductus arteriosus defects which allow blood to bypass the lungs and a 10.8-percent increase in ventricular septal defects, a hole in the heart that causes abnormal blood flow.

# Hippocratic Oath ethical guideline

BOSTON (UPI) — The Hippocratic Oath, used in many modern medical schools to swear in newly educated physicians, is believed to be the earliest document in medical ethics.

It was named for Hippocrates, the ancient Greek physician who helped turn medicine into a systematic science based on the art of observation and the practice of clinical examination.

The oath reads:

"I swear by Apollo, the physician, and Aesculapius, and Health, and All-heal, and all the gods and goddesses, that, according to my ability and judgment, I will keep this oath and stipulation: to reckon him who taught me this art equally dear to me as my parents; to share my substance with him and relieve his necessities if required; to regard his offspring as on the same footing with my own brothers, and to teach them this art if they should wish to learn it, without fee or stipulation, and that by precept, lecture and every other mode of instruction. I will impart a knowledge of the art to my own sons and to those of my teachers, and to disciples bound by a stipulation and oath, according to the law of medicine, but to no others.

"I will follow that method of treatment which, according to my ability and judgment, I consider for the benefit of my patients, and abstain from whatever is deleterious and mischievous. I will give no deadly medicine to anyone if asked, nor suggest any such counsel; furthermore, I will not give to a woman an instrument to produce an abortion.

"With purity and with holiness I will pass my life and practice my art. I will not cut a person

## Doctor's tongue-in-cheek version targets oath

BOSTON (UPI) — A tongue-in-cheek revision of the physician's Hippocratic Oath contains pledges to treat the insured and guard against malpractice at all costs.

Dr. David Schiedermayer's version of the more than 2,000-year-old oath appeared in today's *New England Journal of Medicine*.

Schiedermayer's Corporate Version reads: "I swear by Humana and the American Hospital Supply Corporation and health maintenance organizations and preferred provider organizations and all the prepayment systems and joint ventures, making them my witnesses, that I will fulfill according to my ability and judgment this oath and this covenant.

"In fear of malpractice I will guard my life and my business.

"I will not use the knife unless I am a surgeon, but I will try to learn some form of endoscopy.

"Into whatever clinics I may enter, I will come for the benefit of the insured, keeping myself far from all except capitated care for the underprivileged, especially if they are not covered by the group contract.

who is suffering from a stone, but will leave this to be done by practitioners of this work. Into whatever houses I enter I will go into them for the benefit of the sick and will abstain from every voluntary act of mischief and corruption, and, further, from the seduction of females or males, bond or free.

"Whatever, in connection with my professional practice, or not in connection with it, I may see or

"Things that I may see or hear in the course of treatment or even outside treatment regarding the life of human beings — things that one should never divulge outside — I will report to government commissions or administrators, or will use in my book."

But Schiedermayer said his view of his colleagues is not quite as jaded as his Corporate Oath seems to indicate.

"Whatever we say about the profession of medicine, it has a noble ideal at its heart. I think that essential desire to help people is really there. If you read medical school applications, you realize that these people are not out to make money, but to help people.

Like the Hippocratic Oath, Schiedermayer's pledge ends with the promise of a blessing upon those who live up to its terms, and a curse upon those who do not.

"If I fulfill this oath and do not violate it, may it be granted to me to enjoy life and business, and to be able to retire at the age of 50 in the Sun Belt; if I transgress it and swear falsely, may Milwaukee be my lot."

hear in the lives of men which ought not to be spoken abroad, I will not divulge, as reckoning that all such should be kept secret.

"While I continue to keep this oath unviolated, may it be granted to me to enjoy life and the practice of the art, respected by all men at all times, but should I trespass and violate this oath, may the reverse be my lot."
