SUIT FOR BREACH OF PROMISE

Plaintiff Widow of 53; Defendant a Bachelor of 75.

Hartford, Conn., Feb. 15.—Thomas K. Pitts of Ashford, 75 years old, who represented that town in the General Assembly from 1883 to 1885, and in 1905, and in the constitutional convention of 1902, was a defendant before Judge Wheeler and a jury in the supreme court yesterday in a suit for \$10,000 damages for alleged breach of promise of marriage.

She declares that about November, 1903, Mr. Pitts asked her to marry him and she promised to do so, but he refused to keep his promise.
