

A friendly substitute for sunshine

SCIENTISTS are experimenting with the oldest and best loved commodity in the world—sunshine. For it appears that the rays of the sun have extraordinary curative properties. The exact nature of this therapeutic value has, however, not yet been determined.

Some experiments indicate a relation between the therapeutic rays of the sun and the mysterious vitamins which play so vital a part in life and health. CRUCIFIXION IS SUNG AT ST. JOHN'S

Church Filled for Impressive Service—Gilboy and Hole Soloists.

A congregation which completely filled St. John's Episcopal Church heard The Crucifixion, a Holy Week meditation, reverently and effectively sung last evening by the surprised choir, with special soloists. The music is by Sir John Stainer and the words are by Rev. W. J. Sparrow-Simpson, M. A. The theme of the words and music is the suffering and death of Christ on the cross.

William Owen Gilboy of New York and R. H. Bertram Hole of this city, well known soloists, took the principal tenor and baritone parts respectively. Both have sung in the same cantata on several occasions, giving them a familiarity with the composition which added much to the charm of the rendition. Both were heard to advantage throughout, particularly in the duet for tenor and baritone, beginning "So thou livest thy divine petition."

The part of the High Priest was ably sung by Howard Clark, bass; and that of the two malefactors who were crucified with Christ by Archie E. Arnold, bass; and Robert A. Masland, tenor. The singing of the choir on the chorus parts compared favorably with that at former renditions of the cantata by the same singers. The presentation was under the direction of Miss Alona G. McKay, organist and choir director, who was commended on the success of the cantata by a number of musicians who were present. At intervals, hymns in which choir and congregation joined were sung.

The rector of St. John's, Rev. Condit N. Eddy, conducted a brief devotional service before the cantata and pronounced the blessing at the close.

Good Friday services were held at St. John's at 9:30 o'clock this morning and from 12 o'clock to 3 o'clock this afternoon, the passion service taking place during these three hours.
