

NAMISNAK GOING BIG AT DEAN

John Namisnak of this city, better known as "Doughnuts" on the athletic field and who answers to the sobriquet of "Biff Dugan" in the prize ring, is making a big name for himself at Dean Academy, Franklin, Mass., where he is playing football on the football team. The eleven has played two games to date, and Johnny covered himself with glory in both contests, ripping off considerable yardage and scoring a touch down in the second encounter. On the coming Saturday the Auburn boy will start at fullback against the Penn State frosh, who will be engaged at Franklin.

A little over a week ago Namisnak took to another sport and distinguished himself. He entered a seven mile swim in which there were nearly 50 prep school entries from all over New England, and finished in seventh place. He was the only Dean student who completed the aquatic marathon.

When the football season is over John expects to go out for the school basketball team, and in the Spring he will devote his athletic efforts to baseball. Before going to Dean, Namisnak was a star athlete at Auburn Academic High School, where he was a member of the football, basketball and baseball teams. He captained the team last Fall, led in scoring and was selected as second team fullback on the mythical Central New York all-scholastic team. In baseball he played the outfield, and led the club in hitting.

DIAMOND DUST

Fourteen major league baseball teams were disbanded today, and more than 350 players were starting for their homes, barring the few who will witness the world's series, starting Wednesday at Pittsburgh.

The curtain dropped on the 1927 season yesterday with only one contest on for positions. The St. Louis Cardinals defeated the Chicago Cubs, 6-4, and gained second place in the National League. The New York Giants, who had aspired for the runner-up post, beat out Philadelphia, 5-4, in 10 innings but landed in third place, one-half game behind the world's champions. The Cardinals were booked for a double header against the Cubs but rain set in during the eighth inning and the second game had to be cancelled.

Pittsburgh claimed the season one and one-half games ahead of St. Louis. The National League champions lost their final game to Cincinnati, 1-0. Chicago ended in fourth place, six and one-half games behind the Giants. Cincinnati was fifth, and the Brooklyn Dodgers, who won their closing game from Boston, 5-3, finished sixth. Boston was seventh and Philadelphia last.

The Yankees were not scheduled yesterday but they won the American pennant with 13 1/2 games to spare over Philadelphia. Washington beat Philadelphia 8-5, in the last game and placed third. Detroit took a double header from Cleveland, 11-5 and 4-0, and ended in fourth place, two and one-half games behind Washington. Chicago finished fifth, Cleveland sixth and the St. Louis Browns, who closed with an 8-3 win over Chicago, were seventh. The Boston Red Sox brought up the rear of the procession. A coincidence of the final standing shows that the Red Sox and the Philadelphia Nationals finished last in their respective leagues with the same percentage, each having won 51 games and lost 101. Philadelphia was 43 games ahead from Pittsburgh and first place, while the Red Sox were 59 games behind the Yankees.

New batting leaders were crowned in Detroit circuit. Harry Heilmann of Detroit snatched the American League honor away from Al Simmons of Philadelphia by getting seven hits in nine times at bat in yesterday's double header at Detroit. Heilmann closed with a mark of 396; Simmons being second with 392. Heilmann succeeds, Heinie Manush of Detroit, who set the pace last year with 380. Paul Waner of Pittsburgh carried
