## OLYMPIC EVENT IN PENN TOURNEY

Philadelphia, April 5.—(AP)—In an effort to aid the Olympic Committee in developing athletes for the 3,000 meter steeplechase race, Lawson Robertson, head coach of the American Olympic team and also of the Pennsylvania track team has had the event placed on the program of the University of Pennsylvania relay carnival April 27 and 28.

The steeplechase will replace the 2-mile international race, which has been one of the features of the carnival for years. College distance runners from many sections of the country are expected by Robertson to enter for the competition.

The event will be run on the inside of the eluder path on Franklin Field. Every quarter mile will be a water jump, with three feet hurdles firmly fixed on the edge of the jump. The hazard will be 14 feet long with five feet of water at the deepest point. Each competitor must jump over or go through the water. Stepping aside will automatically eliminate the contestant.

# WEISMULLER IS KING SWIMMER

Chicago, April 5.—(AP)—Grinnin' Johnny Weismuller still is America's speediest swimmer. Competing last night against the fastest field he ever had faced in the National Amateur Athletic Union's indoor championships, he scored a close victory over Walter Lauffer of the Lake Shore Athletic Club, Chicago, to retain his title in the 100 yard free style event. His time was 50 4-5 seconds, just one second slower than his own world mark.

Weismuller also led the Illinois Athletic Club team to its third national title and third world's relay record in two nights—the 300 yard medley relay. The time was 3:50 1-2 seconds—3-5 seconds faster than a previous international record which was also held by the I. A. C. Tuesday. The I. A. C. team shattered the world marks in the 400 and 600 yard relays.
