

## Mrs. Outhwaite on 90 Foot Boat Crossing Atlantic

Mrs. Leonard Outhwaite, a daughter of the late Gen. John Heuson of Washington, D. C., and very well known as a visitor to Owaseo Lake Summer homes, is among the members of a yachting party, planning at New York City for a voyage to the Azores in a 90-foot boat.

The story of the proposed voyage as it appears in the New York World follows:

After a delay because of the failure of most of the crew to show up after their Saturday night ashore, the 90-foot yacht Kinkajou, smaller than Columbus's flagship, got off for the Azores at 1:48 p. m. yesterday, carrying Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Outhwaite of 460 East 52nd Street, and Edward P. Borden, also of New York.

The yacht, which was scheduled to depart at noon Saturday, was first held up it was said, by failure to acquire the proper sea letters for the voyage ahead. There were other small deficiencies and delays.

Capt. O. Berg, the Outhwaites and Mr. Borden appeared at the Montauk Yacht Club landing at the East River and 52nd Street at 9:30 a. m. yesterday, only to find the crew not yet there. So Captain Berg made a quick telephone canvass of his friends of the seagoing profession and in a few hours had rounded up four huskies to complete the Kinkajou's complement.

The Kinkajou weighed anchor early in the afternoon amid the cheers of a group of friends on the yacht club landing. With her Diesel motor in operation, she slipped down the East River, under the Queensboro, Manhattan and Brooklyn bridges. After passing Quarantine the Kinkajou's master expects to rely almost entirely on his sails.

Billy, the Kinkajou's feline mascot, will share the hazards of the voyage. He will have an opportunity, his master and mistress hope, to witness the racing regatta of the Royal Yacht Squadron on the Isle of Wight in August.

Mr. Outhwaite was graduated from Yale in 1915, and until a few months ago had had little yachting experience. Recently he has been devoting himself to preparations for the voyage. Captain Berg was master of one of the American vessels that competed in the trans-Atlantic race for King Alfonso's cup last Summer.

The Kinkajou was built in 1925 by John Alden, descendant of the New Englander by the same name whom Priscilla preferred to Miles Standish. She is a vessel of only 70 tons. Her body is painted black. The hold is divided into two parts, one with quarters for the crew and the other containing two cabins for the owners.

Mr. Borden expects to return to New York by September. The Outhwaites plan to make the return trip in the same vessel, via the Madeira and Cape Verde islands, the Caribbean, the mouth of the Amazon and Florida.

Enough Diesel oil for 300 sailing hours was loaded aboard. Drinking water supplies are calculated to provide five gallons a day for the time needed to reach the Azores. The trip across, it is expected, will consume 25 days.
