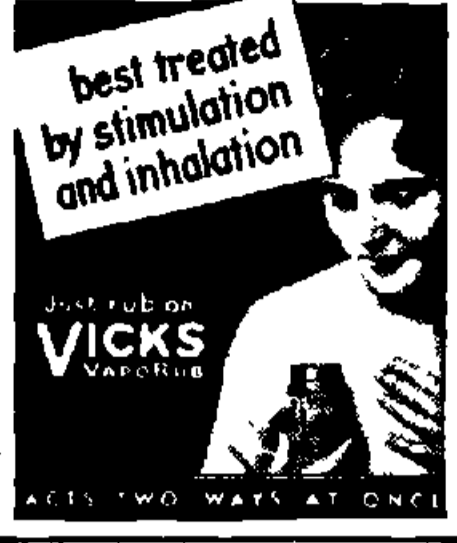


# Chest Colds

## HOW'S your HEALTH

The tired business man is proverbial, but evidently his alleged fatigue doesn't seriously impair his constitution. Compared with the typical American, the average business man makes a good showing as a physical specimen. This was revealed by the research division of the Milbank Memorial Fund, from physical examination records of 100,000 active-born adult males. Lumping together their various disabilities for all age groups, it was found that the skilled trades division showed the highest prevalence of physical defects and disabilities, while the professional group had the lowest prevalence. The business man has better eyesight than the skilled worker, better teeth and gums than the farmer, and he has fewer defects of the respiratory tract than either. Contrary to the stage picture of the highly irritable business man, he was found to be comparatively free from nervousness, dizziness and back-ache—and he is no more afflicted with defects or illness of the digestive system than is the average person.

Curiously, however, it was found that more business men than farmers are users of patent medicines.

The most serious disabilities which the business group was shown to be suffering from were those affecting the heart and the circulatory system.

There was a high prevalence in the business group of defects of the valves of the heart, and abnormal changes in the heart musculature.

Slight and moderate thickening of the arteries was another common defect in the business group. Rapid and irregular pulses also were more common among business men.

## CANDLE LIGHT SERVICE AT ST. PETER'S NEXT SUNDAY

The St. Cecilia Choir of girls and women practiced last evening under Prof. E. E. Scovill for the Epiphany Candle Light Service which will be held in St. Peter's church at 5 o'clock next Sunday. Both choirs will practice together Friday night at 7 o'clock. This is one of the most attractive of the special services of Auburnians every year look forward to. The church is always filled and people come from miles around to take part in it.

This beautiful service shows in a symbolic way how the coming of Christ brought light into this world of darkness, and how the light has been carried through the ages.

Before and after the service the congregation will have the opportunity to see the beautiful Nativity scene in the church. This group, representing the little gathering in the stable at Bethlehem, was used for the first time during the holidays of 1925. Today, the Feast of the Epiphany, the figures of the shepherds and the ox and the ass and the lambs were restored, and replaced by figures representing the Wise Men, as the Feast of the Epiphany tells us the story of the coming of the Wise Men to Bethlehem to find the Christ Child.

The whole scene will be kept in the church until after next Sunday evening's service. Children and grown-ups visit this little scene daily and all are impressed by its beauty and devotional atmosphere.

### Dies of Bullet Wound

Rochester, N. Y., Jan. 6.—(AP)—William Brightman, 38, shot Saturday night by a deputy sheriff after he had wounded John McCarthy, 66, Philadelphia, died yesterday in St. Mary's Hospital.

Brightman ran amuck with a revolver when he returned to the farm on which he had been working to find McCarthy had taken his job. Miss Clara Chase, his former employer, escaped from the house and summoned help from neighbors, who kept Brightman barricaded until sheriff's deputies arrived. In the ensuing gun play Brightman received a fatal wound.

McCarthy, shot in the head and neck, was reported out of danger today.

## FEDERAL CIVIL SERVICE EXAMINATIONS ANNOUNCED

The United States Civil Service Commission has announced open competitive examinations as follows: Local inspector of boilers, \$3,200 a year, inland ports other than central western rivers; local inspector of hulls, \$3,200 a year, assistant inspector of hulls, \$2,900 a year, all classes of ports; Steamboat inspection Service.

Junior engineer, \$2,000 a year, various services, for duty in Washington, D.C., or in the field.

Assistant radio operator (airways), \$1,800 to \$2,500 a year; junior radio operator (airways), \$1,620 to \$1,920 a year; Bureau of Lighthouses, Department of Commerce.

All states except Maryland, Virginia, Vermont, and the District of Columbia have received less than their share of appointments in the apportioned Departmental Service at Washington, D.C.
