

Latest News. BY TELEGRAPH. Last Night's Dispatches. IMPORTANT NEWS FROM WASHINGTON. The Execution of the Conspirators. Mrs. Surratt, Harold, Payne and Abnerrent Hung.

A Writ of Habeas Corpus Disregarded. PARTICULARS OF THE BURNING OF THE WILLIAM NELSON. PROGRESS OF UNION SENTIMENT IN GEORGIA.

WASHINGTON, July 7. All the condemned conspirators sentenced to be hanged to day were executed. On the petition of Mary E. Surratt, through her counsel Messrs. Allen and Clappitt, Judge Wiley of the Supreme Court of this District directed an issue of the writ of habeas corpus to General Hancock, commanding him to produce in court at 10 o'clock this morning the body of Mary E. Surratt, with the cause and day of her detention.

The officers entrusted with the execution, and the ministers occupied intermediate positions. The execution of the writ was refused. The writ was served on Gen. Hancock at the Metropolitan Hotel at 8 o'clock this morning by United States Marshal Goodrich. He immediately consulted with the Attorney General and the Secretary of War. At 10:30 o'clock the General had not obeyed the writ. This fact was brought to the notice of the court by her counsel, but the Judge said he had not the power to enforce the writ.

Early-to-day guards were placed round the Arsenal grounds, to prevent the intrusion of persons to the scene of execution, none being admitted excepting those previously supplied with tickets by Maj. Gen. Hancock. The relations of Mrs. Surratt and Harold, spent several hours with them during the forenoon, and they were also attended by their spiritual advisers, as were also Payne and Abnerrent. A few minutes after 11 o'clock the military officers were ordered to march to the Arsenal grounds on her way to the gallows by two private officers. Next followed Atzerott, Harold and Payne, accompanied by a guard and their respective ministers of the gospel. Front seats were provided for them on the platform in the following order: Mrs. Surratt, Payne, Harold and Atzerott.

The minister who had been administering to Payne expressed in the name of the latter his thanks to Gen. Hancock for the care and good bye, gentlemen now before me. One of the clergymen standing near exclaimed: "May we all meet in the other world." As soon as the noon was placed round each of the conspirators, the firing began, and the section of the platform on which they had been standing, suddenly fell, and the culprits were hurled several feet from the ground. Mrs. Surratt and Payne scarcely moved a muscle. Atzerott exhibited some indignation, but he was hurled more nervous sensibly than any of the others.

The bodies hung until life was extinct, and were afterwards given over for burial, the rough coffins being placed in the ground. The arrangements for the execution were perfect. Major General Hancock was present throughout the proceedings. It is said Payne, and that made a statement in behalf of Mrs. Surratt, extending to the New York Herald, and another person, subscribed to an affidavit testifying the testimony of an important witness against her.

WASHINGTON, July 7. The morning Judge Wiley's application of the writ of habeas corpus to Gen. Hancock to produce the body of Mrs. Surratt before the court. The writ was returnable at 10 o'clock, but nearly two hours after that time Gen. Hancock entered the court accompanied by Attorney Gen. Speed, who apologized for the apparent delay in making a return on the part of the general as it was unavoidable. He then proceeded to read the return in which Gen. Hancock said the body of Mrs. Surratt was in his possession under and by virtue of an order of President Johnson for the purpose expressed &c. which order is as follows:—

EXECUTIVE ORDER, July 7. To Maj. Gen. W. S. Hancock, commanding &c. I, Andrew Johnson, President of the United States, hereby declare that the writ of habeas corpus has been heretofore suspended in such cases as this, and I do hereby specially suspend this writ and direct that you proceed to execute the order heretofore given upon the judgment of the military commission and you will give this return in return to the writ.

The court remarked that no further appeal would be taken in the matter. Gen. Hancock immediately rejoined, commenting upon the distinction between the civil and military jurisdiction, showing the utter impossibility of fighting battles, carrying on war, maintaining the Government in times of war &c. by the Department of State has been officially informed that the Spanish Government proposes landing orders to the Captain General of Cuba to deliver to the U.
