DROWNED.—A young man named Christopher Avery, working at Wilson's coal yard, while wheeling a barrow of coal from the dock to a vessel last evening, was precipitated into the water by the upsetting of a plank, and was drowned. The body was recovered shortly afterwards, and Coroner Walsh notified. Deceased was a single man, twenty-two years old, and resided with his parents, on Maple street, between Carlton and High streets.

BURGLARY AND LARCENY CASE.—Elizabeth Nash, the woman who, it is alleged, broke into the Grand Trunk freight house and stole a coat belonging to Thomas Finn, was arraigned for burglary and larceny this morning at the police court. According to her own statement, she has been living with Finn as his wife for some time, and went to the freight house to find him. She alleges that Finn has used her very cruelly, and avers that she did not break open a door of the freight house as stated. Finn is evidently anxious to get rid of her. The case went over until the afternoon.

KILLED AT NIAGARA FALLS.—Yesterday a man named Hielman, a resident of Black Rock, was killed by falling over the cliff near Table Rock at Niagara Falls. He had gone down with an excursion party from the Riverdale M. E. Church, and was sitting on a stump at the edge of the cliff. The earth gave way under one of his feet and he toppled over and fell. His lifeless body, mangled by the rocks, was recovered at the foot of the cliff. Mr. Hielman was a man quite advanced in years, and he is said to have several sons employed in the Black Rock Rolling mill.

AT THE FALLS.—Cols. Ryan and Currier, of the late Cuban cavalry, are the observed of all observers at the Clifton House, which they reached a week ago, after an exciting escape from the Cuban island. The flag presented by the Cuban ladies of New York to Colonel Ryan is preserved by him, and now decorates his room at the hotel. The Cubans visiting the Falls have called upon them and proffered them every assistance required. They report that their stay is to be brief there, when they will be again off with a thousand or more volunteers for the island of Cuba. They deny, however, that they have any purpose to violate the laws of the United States in the execution of their plans.

Col. Ryan also pronounces as without foundation the story that a body of the Cuban volunteers had made their way to some point of rendezvous on the Canadian frontier.
