A Luckless Sneak Thief, and a Chambermaid Heroine.

The residence of J. Condit Smith, Esq., No. 472 Delaware street, was visited, Tuesday evening, by a young man of twenty, named James Thomas Sigru.

Quickly entering the unfurnished door, Mr. Sigru proceeded up stairs, passed into one of the apartments, and proceeded with deliberation to make a bundle of such valuable articles of clothing, etc., as he could find.

A struggle ensued between the chambermaid and the thief. He struck her several times upon the head, cutting her severely, but she would not let go.

Great commotion followed. The servants screamed and hallooed, and the murderer vainly endeavored to get out. He would probably have escaped in the end, but by a fortunate chance Mr. Dean Wilson drove along the street by the house, and stopped to ascertain the cause of the uproar.

Police Court - Oscar Taylor was arraigned at the police court, to-day, on a charge of cruelty to two sore and galled horses.

Richard Butler and Moses O'Neil, charged with grand larceny in stealing nine sand box covers belonging to the Lake Shore railroad, were held guilty of petit larceny and sentenced to four months' imprisonment each at the workhouse.

Henry Griffin was sentenced to sixty days' confinement at the workhouse, for the larceny of a small quantity of wood, belonging to the Erie railway.

August Fieting pleaded guilty of assault and battery on Louis Neil. He was fined ten dollars.

Richard Lobdell was fined the like amount for an assault and battery on Mary H. Bush.

Charles Swapp, William Felt, and Louis Schlager, were fined five dollars each for assaulting and battery George Berger.

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
