For the middle states and west, variable winds with threatening weather and rain, followed by partly cloudy weather and lower temperature by Thursday morning.

LATEST LOCAL.

Police Record.—Only two arrests were effected by the police force during the twenty-four hours ending this morning. Four of the prisoners were charged with drunkenness, one with disorderly conduct, one with assault and battery, one with larceny, one with vagrancy, one with neglect of family, and one with burglary.

Barred Third.—Another fellow who has been stealing from the cars of the Lake Shore railroad, Benjamin Klump by name, was arrested Tuesday afternoon by Specials Kraft and Leaman, of the Eighth precinct, on charge of burglary and larceny.

On Trial.—Charges having been preferred against Patrolman Reardon, the policeman who arrested Alderman Emmett, and he was placed on trial before the Board of Police Commissioners this forenoon. There was a large attendance of witnesses and interested spectators.

Police Court.—Oso George Knapp was arraigned before Justice Nash, to-day, on charge of stealing a five dollar bill from Charles B. Andrews. He acknowledged the theft, and was fined twenty dollars.

John Landman, arrested for selling milk from cows fed on distillery waste, waived examination and gave bail for his appearance before a higher court.
