

A TERRIBLE PARRICIDE.

A CHICAGO MURDERED BY HIS OWN SONS. They Desired to Prevent His Marriage and Secure His Property—Almost Conclusive Evidence—The Parties in Custody.

Since the last issue of the Tribune some startling developments have been made in the Frederick Ruetz murder case, which indicate beyond a doubt that the old man was murdered by one of his sons for the purpose of preventing his marriage with a widow, and thus depriving the sons of an inheritance, and also for the purpose of robbery.

UNDER ARREST, CHARGED WITH THE MURDER. Frederick Ruetz, Jr., a young man twenty-five years old, eldest son of the murdered man, was taken in custody this afternoon about one o'clock, and now occupies the Chicago avenue police station. He was placed there by Captain (Grand) and is not allowed to see his father or mother.
