The grain trade of Boston is more than holding its own. Though the receipts of wheat during the month of June were only 70,000 bushels, against 321,000 bushels during the same month last year, the receipts of corn increased from 221,000 to 1,556,000 bushels. Since the 1st of January the receipts of corn have been 6,622,000 bushels, against 5,122,000 bushels. The flour trade is also increasing rapidly. Boston's hold on the export trade in this article to the maritime provinces of Canada is as decided as ever.

An extremely interesting marriage has just taken place in France. At the cathedral of Reims, on the 19th of June, the Countess Guy de Foligno, a relation of the present minister for foreign affairs in the cabinet of Versailles, was married to Marie-Alexandre de Launay, daughter of the Viscount de Launay, of Champagne renown, the witness including the Duc de Choiseul and the Prince de Liancourt.

Prince Victor Napoleon, the seventeen-year-old son of Prince Jerome, and the new heir to the Bonaparte idea, is rather tall, handsome and strong as a deer; dark hair, blue and eyes; and in temper and disposition a true Co. de Bonaparte. His features are regular, his hair is treated, over his eyes and eyebrows, and he has another smooth, though not the peculiar nose of the house of Savoy. He is said to be a thorough Napoleon in looks, character and in a certain fiery impetuosity of temper.

According to the monthly oil statement of the Oil City Derrick, there were 67 wells completed in the month of June, increasing the daily production 8,200 barrels, an average of 25 1/2 bbl. per well. There are 744 wells commenced and in various stages of advancement, showing a slight decline in operations. Only ten unproductive wells were drilled. This heavy average of production shows the territory now in course of development to be extraordinarily good. It is quite possible, however, that the Derrick's estimate of the average is too high.

An anecdote of Commodore Perry and President Buchanan is related in the Lancaster Intelligencer. A report of the recent death of the commodore's widow, Anne Belmont, who was in love with the commodore's daughter and warmly pressed his suit. Mrs. Perry and her daughter were willing, but it was supposed that the old commodore would object on account of the suitor's nationality. President Buchanan was the friend in the case and eloquently pleaded with the commodore one day in Belmont's behalf. After the president had concluded the old hero replied in his bluff, sailor-like manner: "What the h—l do I care; the girl can do as she pleases." And she did.

Speaking at the annual banquet of the Caledonian club in London, Mr. Baxter made reference to the protectionist tariff in Canada as follows: "I observe in the newspapers that a deputation of three gentlemen from Canada sailed yesterday for this country for the purpose of trying to persuade the ministry and parliament of Great Britain to guarantee a certain amount, or probably the whole of the cost of working the Canadian Pacific railway. I venture to think that the practical answer to these gentlemen would be, 'Go back to your tariff of your choice'—a tariff conceived in the most hostile spirit to that mother country which you are perpetually blessing in words which your deeds belie."

We may shortly expect to receive some stirring news from Central Asia. Russia is at this moment launching against the Turcomans an expedition of more than twenty thousand men. Stated briefly, the object of this step is to restore the law which has been broken in Russia's prestige since her unfortunate interference last spring in Afghan affairs. It is, above all things, desirable for the maintenance of the Russian name to the east of the Caspian that the disasters which the Turke Turcomans have inflicted in recent years shall not go unavenged. It will also be all the better for Russia's future projects in Central Asia if the punishment of the Turcomans should be so completely accomplished as to carry the Muscovite flag to Mary. It has long been evident that Russia has intended to annex the whole of the Turcoman country between the Oxus and the Caspian and the Persian frontiers. Save a small mountainous fragment of what was once Khokand, which may be absorbed any day, the conquest of the Turcomans will leave no part of Central Asia outside of China and the country which will be at the feet of Russia, Khiva, Bokhara, Khokand and even Persia, already do her bidding.

MURDERED.

Louis Schlachter Throws a Butcher Knife at Peter Miller Inflicting a Fatal Wound.

DEATH OF MILLER.
Schlachter Gives Him Self Up.

The Chippewa street market was the scene of a murderous affray among the butchers' stalls this forenoon. Louis Schlachter, a young man twenty-four years of age, proprietor of stall No. 25, has been arrested for some time past by the tantalizing accusations toward him of Peter Miller and Joseph Trautman, who have staidly opposed to that of Schlachter's. To-day they renewed their attempt and one of them threw a chunk of liver at Schlachter, hitting him in the face. He jumped up in a fit of anger and drew a knife, having an edge as sharp as that of a razor, and threw it at the other twofold. It struck Miller under the knee, and penetrating to the bone, glanced downward, outside a terrible gash, from which the blood flowed in a stream. No one of the many persons present seemed to have forethought enough to put a compress on the upper part of the wound, and he lay, and he was allowed to lie on the floor and slowly bleed to death. Doctors Dhill and Stork were sent for but too late to save his life. His assailant fled immediately after the commission of the deed. The police were notified and a description of the fugitive telegraphed to all stations. Shortly after twelve o'clock he came into police headquarters and gave himself up. He was laboring under great nervous excitement and appearing to appreciate the enormity of the crime committed, wept bitterly.

FRANCE.
FERRY'S EDUCATION BILL.
VERSAILLES, July 9.—The chamber of deputies yesterday by 251 to 71 rejected the amendment to Ferry's education bill introduced by M. Madier de Montjan dining at the prohibition of all religious orders from teaching.

SPAIN.
THE INSURER TO THE FLAG.
MADRID, July 9.—In congress yesterday the minister of marine stated the government had no intention of sending Spanish men-of-war to Chilean waters, as Spain had no commerce with either intelligent republic, Castellar, continuing his speech in advocacy of the jurisdiction of the authorities of Puerto Plata for insulting the Spanish flag, urged that the public press be permitted to discuss freely all important questions, and he incidentally characterized the government of the restoration as reactionary. He said in view of no restriction which had provided against the restoration, for it was impossible to govern against the wishes of the people. There have been other and similar attacks on the government by members of the opposition lately.

The Saratoga Regatta.
SARATOGA LAKE, N. Y., July 9.—The lake and weather are all that could be desired for racing. Promptly at two o'clock the boats for the pair-off race started. The Zephyr pair, who had No. 4 poles, did not start. The other Zephyr crew gave out before the end of the race. The Olympics of Albany led at the half-mile and the Westchester at the mile.
