CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION. A Resolution Regarding the Railway Strike Introduced-Other Business.

ALBANY, July 10.-When the constitutional convention opened this morning, President Choate appointed the following special committee to examine any amendments after July 15, and decide whether they shall be referred to committees or rejected.

Resolved, That this convention without passing in any manner upon the merits of the quarrel between the railroad companies and their employees, recognizing only that the laws of the United States are being defied by a lawless mob, that the processes of its courts are being defied, and that the foundation of anarchy and bloodshed is being laid.
